TO YOU WHO BRING SMALL CHILDREN TO CHURCH

There you are sitting in worship or bible study. Your child, or toddler, is restless. Perhaps they're even a little boisterous. You try to silence them, and nothing. You try to pacify them with food or toys, and nothing. Eventually, you resort to the last thing you wanted to do: you pick them up, and before a watching audience, you make the march out of the auditorium. All the while, you're a little embarrassed. Maybe you're a little frustrated too. You might even think to yourself, "There's no point in coming to church. I get nothing out of it because I have to constantly care for my kid."

I want you—you mothers and/or fathers—to know just how encouraging you are to so many. The little elderly woman who often feels alone beams with a smile at the sigh of you wresting with your little one. She's been there before. She knows how hard it can be, but she smiles because hearing that brings back precious memories. To see young parents and their small children brighten her day, and she may have just received bad news this week about her health, but seeing the vitality of young ones removes—if but for a moment—her fears.

The older man who always seems to be grouchy notices you too. He's always been talking about how children in this day have no respect or sense of good. But, he sees you-a young family-in church, and you don't miss any gatherings. Like clockwork, he can depend on the sight of you and your young family. You give him hope that maybe the church isn't doomed after all, because there are still young parents who love God enough to bring their restless children to worship.

Bring your children to church. <u>If you don't hear crying, the church is dying.</u> As hard as it might be for you as a parent who's half-asleep, keep on doing what you're doing. You are an encouragement, and you're starting off your children's lives as you should.



ST. JACOB'S FOOD PANTRY 2019 Capital Improvement Project

Since approximately May, 2018 fresh produce for the pantry's monthly food distribution to recipients has been limited. From late 2017 through April/May, 2018 varying amounts of fresh produce on pallets had been received from the Central Pennsylvania Food Bank ("CPFB") located in Harrisburg. About May, 2018 the CPFB made the determination that the sole, once a month, Saturday delivery of produce to our St. Jacob's Food Pantry could not be sustained. Given our local pantry's lack of refrigeration space, the availability of fresh produce for a first Saturday of the month distribution was limited to that produce that could be kept in good condition when received from CPFB on a regularly scheduled 4th Thursday of the previous month. From time to time this holding period is not two days, but nine days.

Currently our local pantry has a standing three-door, reach-in refrigeration unit and four operational standing freezer units. The shelf capacity of the three-door refrigeration unit is less than the quantity of produce on one pallet of fresh produce. Generally, having a pallet of produce is about what it takes to provide for the 110 families or more that have been making use of our local pantry. The standing freezer units can accommodate frozen meats and fish which are distributed monthly, but are insufficient to store enough frozen turkeys at Thanksgiving and Christmas time.

Our food pantry has a pallet jack that is used to move pallets around the monthly distribution area. If a truck with a lift-gate were rented, a pallet of food could possibly be picked up the Friday before distribution and stored inside the Lutheran's facility through their 2017 installed access door and turning down the air conditioning in that space. Unless produce was manually transferred from one pallet to another only a single pallet could be transported, moved onto the truck's lift gate, lowered to ground level and moved inside. While having one pallet of produce to distribute is better than none, the availability of produce from CPFB has been more extensive, and the ability to have adequate person power on a sustained, monthly basis to manually transfer produce is probably a real question.

A more sustainable solution is proposed as follows:

Acquire a new freestanding pole-barn type shed to accommodate items stored in the rear of the Lutheran church's brick building. Snow blowers, lawn care equipment, ladders, and miscellaneous items. The pantry's current refrigerator and freezer units are located in the front portion of this building.

Retrofit the existing brick building to accommodate a walk-in refrigerator unit and a walk-in freezer unit that have pallet wide doors.

Current electrical service needs to be upgraded, Met-Ed would provide the service upgrade to the nearby existing pole and install a new building meter, interior wiring would be completed by Dave Trone and others,

Wider building doorway opening needed to allow pallets to enter/exit,

Existing refrigeration unit would be removed and the remainder of the interior wall separating space between the front and back half of the building would be taken down,

Existing freezers would be retained and positioned along one side of the building as back-up.

Cost to accomplish the project: \$4,500 for a new building shell and floor, \$3,500 for electrical service and wiring, \$11,000 for new walk-in refrigeration and freezer equipment, other work and contingency \$1,000. Total cost \$20,000.

Funding: \$10,000 from existing food pantry resources and up to \$10,000 from St. Jacob's UCC. As of December 31, 2018, our Benevolence Fund had \$13,349 on hand, dollars remaining from our 2018 Back Bay mission trip were another \$4,900, for total resources available of \$18,249.


January 2019 Budget Update (Combined General and Building Funds)

The chart below shows a simplified over view of our budget numbers for the first month of 2019. The numbers through the end of January showed a combined shortfall in the General and Building Funds of \$1,863 between budgeted expenses and actual offerings. Most of this shortfall can be attributed to inclement weather we had for several Sundays in January.

The Early Learning Center made it's shared expense payments of \$700 per week, which helped maintain a balance between overall cash receipts and cash disbursements.
