Greetings

The obvious has been out in stores for weeks: It's commercial Christmas time. Buy! Buy!

No thank you, I don't need it. It's as bad as writing "X-mas" instead of <u>Christmas</u>. Perhaps it is a financial trick? Or one of those untrustworthy conspiracy theories at work? [like forgetting it's the birthday of Jesus-Our Savior]

On the other hand, it does remind some people to drop in for worship on Christmas Eve. [we'll probably see them again at Easter] About 10-15 years ago the singer-songwriter Jackson Browne ruffled a few feathers with his insightful song "The Rebel Jesus." This is why Jesus came to us to let us know God cares. We can rest assured knowing that God is with us. Come Hell or high water and everything/anything in between- we are not alone.

So- let the season begin. Share it with others. Not just in the stores or mallsbut in conversations, smiles, sharing, and hugs. See Jesus in those around you. [then it's Christmas all year long]

Upcoming dates to keep in mind:

Distribution is the first Saturday of each month from 9-11 AM. (If any donations are received the week before, we will stay a little after 11 to get things sorted and placed on the shelves.) Distribution dates for the rest of 2019 are **November 2**, and **December 7**.

We will also be sorting any donations that we receive several other times each month as needed –please be aware the dates previously published are going under some revision as schedules change and we figure out what is going to work the best...we are going to do our best to have both evening and weekday sessions each month so hopefully you can find a time to help. Dates will be announced several weeks in advance. Next dates for sorting: Tuesday Oct 29 (9 AM-?), Saturday Nov 2 (after distribution), and Thursday Nov 14 (7-9PM).

Communion Sunday Duties

Arrive by 9am to begin preparation

Communion trays are located within the cabinet in the Altar room on the left of the sanctuary along with Communion chalice.

One loaf of bread is needed. Please cut into cubes.

Communion cups are located on the third shelf of the cabinet in the Altar room

Wine and white grape fruit juice will be located within the fridge in the closet in the all purpose room. Please do not over fill cups.

Take the Communion trays and chalice to the sanctuary. Place on the Communion table and cover with white cloth prior to service beginning.

At the conclusion of the service please take the trays to the kitchen for clean up. Pour the used wine and grape fruit juice out. Please don't pour back into the bottle. The used bread can be tossed out for the birds or you can take home.

Once the trays are wiped out please return them back to the cabinet for storage until the next communion.

Also remember to change the Altar covers at the end of the service. Check the calendar to see what the next Sunday's cover color should be.


